## ■ Keyboard note names and pitches

The keyboard note names and pitches used in this manual follow the international standard. Middle C is C4, the lowest C is C2, and the highest C is C7. The illustration below shows keyboard key note names from C4 through C5.



# Getting Ready to Play

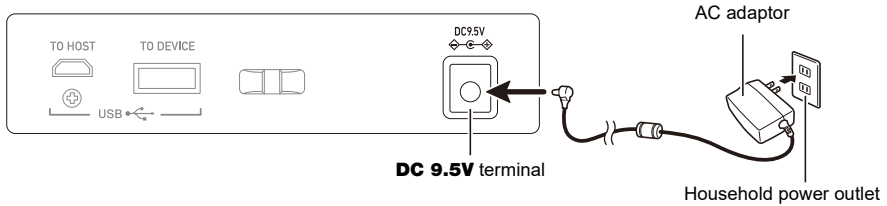
## Preparing a Power Supply

Though either an AC adaptor or batteries can be used for power, use of AC adaptor power is normally recommended.

### Using the AC Adaptor

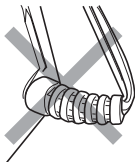
Use only the AC adaptor (JEITA Standard with unified polarity plug) specified for this Digital Keyboard. Use of a different type of AC adaptor can cause malfunction.

**AC Adaptor Type: AD-E95100L (JEITA Standard plug)**

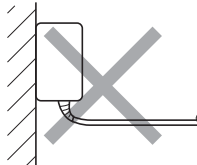


### ⚠ IMPORTANT!

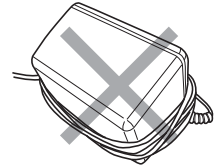
- Be sure to turn off Digital Keyboard power before connecting or disconnecting the AC adaptor.
- The AC adaptor becomes warm to the touch after very long use. This is normal and does not indicate malfunction.
- To prevent breaking of the wire, take care to avoid putting any type of load on the power cord.



No twisting



No pulling



No wrapping

- Never insert metal, pencils, or any other objects into the **DC 9.5V** terminal. Doing so creates the risk of accident.

## Using Batteries for Power

### **!** IMPORTANT!

- Be sure to turn off power before loading batteries.
- Use commercially available AA-size alkaline batteries or AA-size rechargeable nickel metal hydride batteries.
- Low battery power can cause abnormal operation. If this happens, replace batteries with new ones. If you are using rechargeable batteries, charge them.

### ■ Batteries

Note the precautions below when using rechargeable batteries.

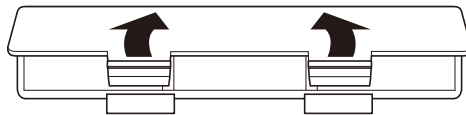
- Use Panasonic Group AA-size eneloop rechargeable batteries. Do not use any other type of batteries.
- Use only the specified charger to charge batteries.
- Rechargeable batteries must be removed from the product for charging.
- For information about using eneloop batteries or their specified charger, be sure to read the user documentation and precautions that come with each item, and use them only as directed.

Be sure to replace batteries at least once a year, even if there is no indication of low battery power.

Dead rechargeable batteries (eneloop) in particular may deteriorate if they are left in the product.

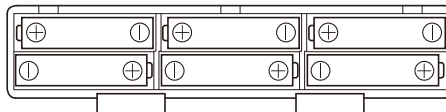
Remove rechargeable batteries from the product as soon as possible after they go dead.

### 1. Open the battery cover on the back of the Digital Keyboard.



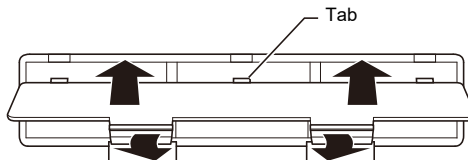
### 2. Load six AA-size batteries into the battery compartment.

- Load batteries with their positive (+) and negative (-) ends facing correctly.



### 3. Insert the tabs of the battery cover into the holes, and close the cover.

- Configure the setting below to specify the type of batteries you loaded.



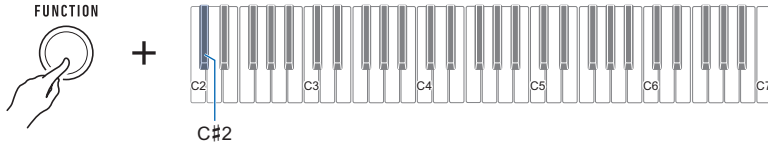


## ■ To specify the battery type

### 1. Turn on the Digital Keyboard.

- See “Turning Power On or Off” (page EN-13).

### 2. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **C#2** keyboard key.



- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.  
One tone: Alkaline batteries  
Two tones: Rechargeable nickel metal hydride batteries

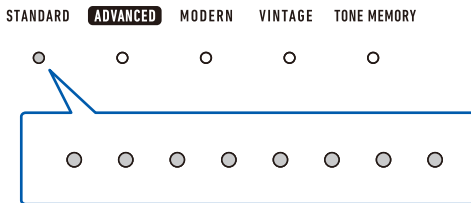
### 3. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## ■ Low Battery Indication

The TONE VARIATION LEDs will flash to indicate that battery power is low. When this happens, replace the batteries with new ones.

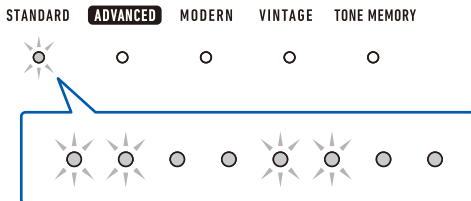
### High Battery Power

Indicated when TONE VARIATION LEDs are lit.



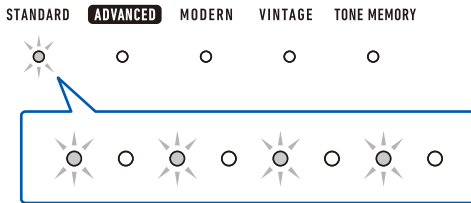
### Declining Battery Power

Indicated when the TONE VARIATION LEDs flash at an interval of a few seconds.



**Battery Replacement Required**

Indicated when the TONE VARIATION LEDs flash.

**NOTE**

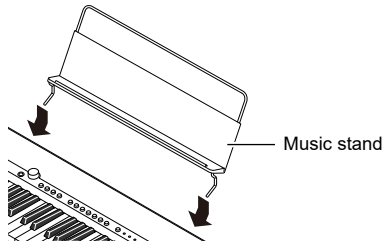
- Low battery power may cause notes to become distorted, or other problems.
- You can conserve battery power by using headphones and by reducing the volume level.

**IMPORTANT!**

- **Continued use with low batteries may cause power to turn off suddenly. This can cause stored data to be corrupted or lost.**

## Preparing the Music Stand

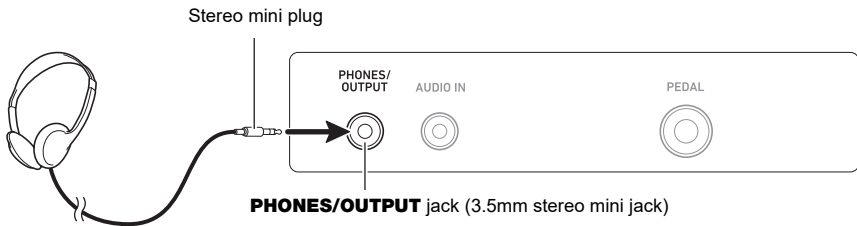
Insert the music stand legs into the back of the Digital Keyboard.



## Connecting Headphones (Option)

Plugging in headphones cuts off output from the built-in speakers, which means you can practice playing even late at night without disturbing others.

- Be sure to turn down the volume level before connecting headphones.



### NOTE

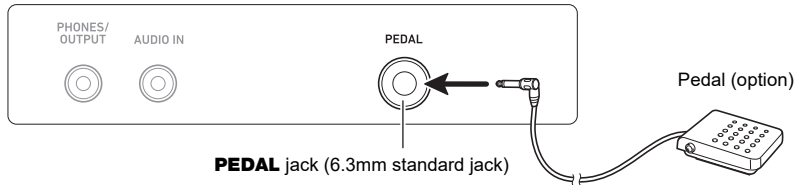
- Headphones do not come with this Digital Keyboard.
- Use the optional (CP-16) or a commercially available headphones.
- The surround effect is not applied while you are listening over headphones.

### IMPORTANT!

- Do not listen to output over headphones at very high volume levels for long periods. Doing so creates the risk of hearing damage.
- The headphones you use must have a 3.5mm 3-pole stereo mini plug. Use of other types of plugs is not supported.
- If the plug of the headphones does not match the **PHONES/OUTPUT** jack, use a commercially available adaptor plug.
- If you are using headphones that require an adaptor plug, make sure you do not leave the adaptor plugged in when removing the headphones.

## Connecting a Pedal (Option)

To use a pedal, connect it to the **PEDAL** jack on the back of the Digital Keyboard.



### NOTE

- A pedal unit does not come with this Digital Keyboard.
- Use the optional (SP-3, SP-20) pedal.

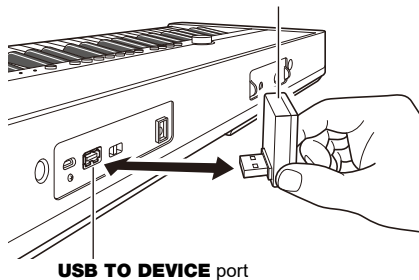
## Connecting the Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor (Option)

To pair this Digital Keyboard with a Bluetooth capable external device, you need to plug the Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor into the Digital Keyboard's **USB TO DEVICE** port.

### IMPORTANT!

- Turn off this Digital Keyboard before connecting the Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor.

Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor (Option: WU-BT10)

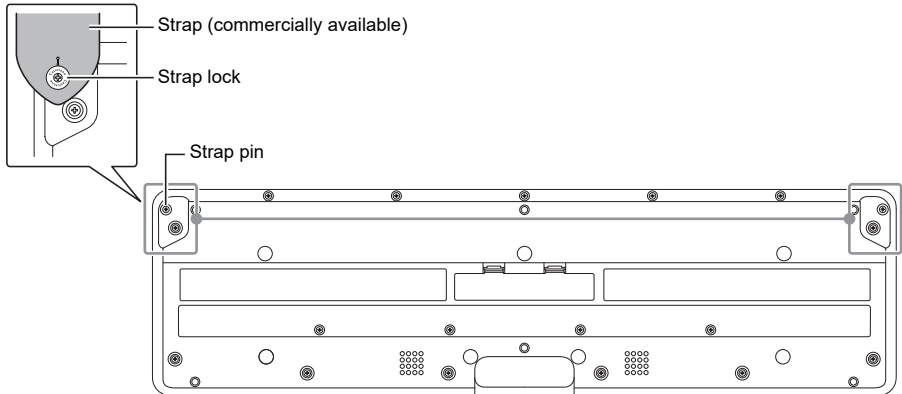


### NOTE

- The Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor does not come with this Digital Keyboard.
- When connecting with a Bluetooth capable external device, refer to "[Sounding a Bluetooth Audio Capable Device \(Bluetooth Audio Pairing\)](#)" (page EN-66).
- The Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor may not be sold in certain countries or geographic areas.

## Attaching a Strap (Commercially Available)

1. Attach a strap (commercially available) to the left and right strap pins on the bottom of the Digital Keyboard.
2. Cover the strap pins with the strap locks.



### **IMPORTANT!**

- After attaching the strap, check to make sure that the strap is securely attached to the Digital Keyboard.
- Do not pick up the Digital Keyboard by the strap alone. Doing so creates the risk of the Digital Keyboard detaching from the strap and falling.
- The recessed area on the bottom of the Digital Keyboard IS NOT intended to be used as a handle. Be sure to use both hands when picking up the Digital Keyboard.
- Should a strap lock ever become deformed or damaged, replace it.

# Playing on the Keyboard

## Turning Power On or Off

### 1. Press the (Power) to turn on Digital Keyboard power.

The Digital Keyboard becomes operational after a few seconds.




### 2. To turn off the Digital Keyboard, hold down the (Power) until all of the LEDs go out.

### IMPORTANT!

---

- Turning off power normally causes the tone and other settings to return to their initial defaults. However, the settings below are remembered.
  - MIDI Output Channels (Main Part, Layer Part)
  - Bluetooth
  - MY SETUP power on recall
  - Auto Power Off
  - Battery type

### NOTE

- Pressing the  (Power) to turn off power actually puts the Digital Keyboard into a standby state. Minute amounts of current continue to flow within the Digital Keyboard in the standby state. If you do not plan to use the Digital Keyboard for a long time or if there is a lightning storm in your area, be sure to unplug the AC adaptor from the power outlet.
- You can configure Digital Keyboard settings so MY SETUP settings are recalled whenever power is turned on. See “[Enabling MY SETUP Power On Recall](#)” (page [EN-47](#)).

## Auto Power Off

While Auto Power Off is enabled, power will turn off automatically after about 30 minutes of non-operation.

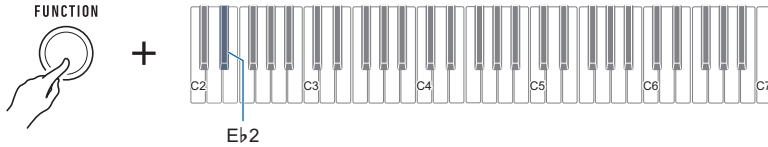
### NOTE

- While the metronome is in use, power will not turn off automatically even if you do not play anything on the keyboard.

### ■ Disabling Auto Power Off

You can disable Auto Power Off to ensure that power does not turn off automatically during a concert, etc.

#### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **E $\flat$ 2** keyboard key.



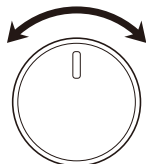
- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.  
High tone: On  
Low tone: Off

#### 2. After disabling Auto Power Off, release **FUNCTION**.

## Adjusting the Volume Level

### 1. Rotate the **VOLUME** knob.

This changes the volume level.

## Using the Metronome

The metronome lets you play and practice along with a steady beat to help keep you on tempo. You can also set a tempo that is suitable for your practice.

### Start/Stop

### 1. Press **METRONOME**.

This starts the metronome.

METRONOME



### 2. Press **METRONOME** again to stop the metronome.

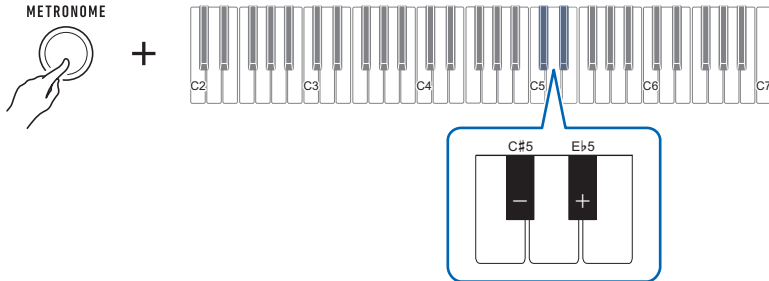


## Specifying the Metronome Beats Per Measure

You can use the procedure below to configure a setting that sounds a chime on the first beat of each measure, and a click for the remaining beats.

- Select a setting of Off (0), or a value of 1 to 16 beats. A reference tone sounds whenever the setting values becomes off (0).

1. Start the metronome.
2. While holding down **METRONOME**, use the **C#5** and **E $\flat$ 5** keyboard keys to change the number of beats setting.



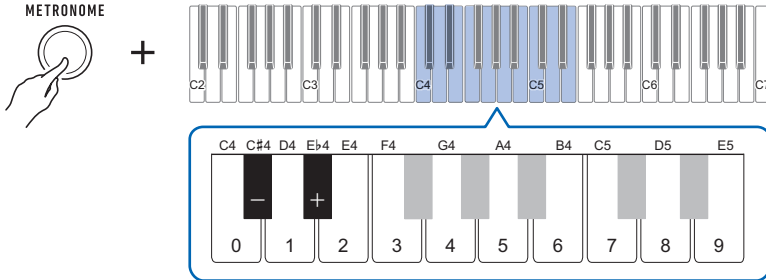
- Selecting Off (0) disables the chime. Use this setting when you want to practice without worrying about the first beat of each measure.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the – and + keyboard keys at the same time.

3. Release **METRONOME** to complete the setting operation.

## Changing the Metronome Tempo

Use the procedure below to change the tempo of the metronome.

1. Start the metronome.
2. Holding down **METRONOME**, use keyboard keys C4 through E5 to change the tempo setting.

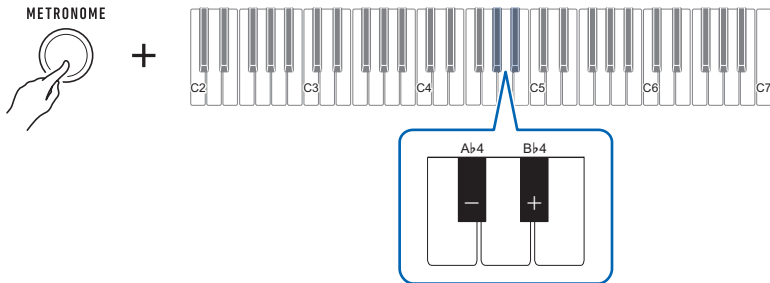


- You can specify a tempo value in the range of 20 to 255.
  - Each press of the – or + keyboard key raises or lowers the tempo by 1. Holding down either button scrolls the setting value.
  - You can also use the tempo value input keys (0 to 9) to enter a specific tempo value.
- Examples:
- To set a tempo of 80, press 8, then 0. The tempo setting will not change until you release **METRONOME** in step 3, below.
  - To set a tempo of 120, press 1, then 2, then 0. In this case, the tempo value will change as soon as you input the third digit.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the – and + keyboard keys at the same time.

3. Release **METRONOME**.

## Changing the Metronome Sound Volume Level

1. Start the metronome.
2. While holding down **METRONOME**, use the **A $\flat$ 4** and **B $\flat$ 4** keyboard keys to change the metronome sound volume level.



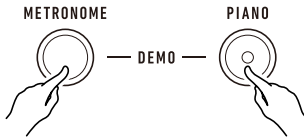
- You can specify a volume value from 0 to 10.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the – and + keyboard keys at the same time.

3. Release **METRONOME** to complete the setting operation.

## Listening to Demo Play

Demo songs include CASIO original tone demo songs and piano demo songs.

### 1. Press **METRONOME** and **PIANO** at the same time.



This causes the **PIANO** button to flash and starts tone demo song play.



- Some tone demo songs use the surround effect. The **SURROUND** button will light while the surround effect is in use.



- Tone demo songs play in sequence, one after another.

### 2. To play a piano demo song, press **PIANO**.

This will start playback of the first piano demo song.

- The 10 built-in piano songs will play in sequence, one after another.

### 3. To select a particular piano demo song for playback, hold down **PIANO** as you press a keyboard key from **C2** to **A2**.

This starts playback of the piano demo song you selected.

### 4. Press **PIANO** again to return to the tone demo songs.

### 5. To stop playback, press **REC/▶/■**.

REC/▶/■



- You can also stop playback by pressing **METRONOME**.

# Controlling the Sound of a Performance

## Selecting a Musical Instrument Tone

This Digital Keyboard lets you play using tones for a wide variety of musical instrument sounds. A bank of main tone buttons are assigned piano, organ, and other tones for quick and easy selection. The same song can sound completely different when played with a different instrument type.

### Playing with a Main Tone

#### 1. Press one of the main tone buttons.

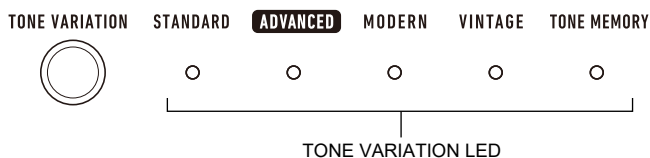
- The button you press lights and the keyboard changes to the button's tone.



#### 2. To change to a variation of a tone, press **TONE VARIATION**.

Each press cycles to the next tone variation.

- A TONE VARIATION LED lights to indicate which variation is selected.



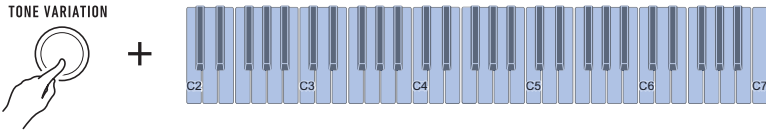
#### NOTE

- Using a main tone button to select a tone causes the settings below to return to their initial defaults.
  - Layer
  - Part volume (main)
  - Sustain
  - Sustain time (main part)
  - Reverb
  - Pedal effect part (main)

## Selecting a Tone

### 1. While holding down **TONE VARIATION**, press a keyboard key from C2 to C7.

This sounds the selected tone.

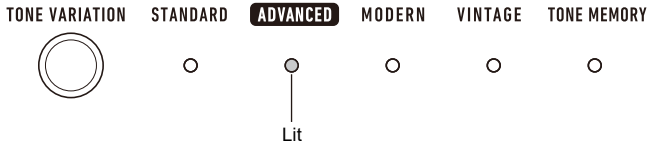


- A TONE VARIATION LED will light to indicate the selected tone's category.
- Each of the keyboard keys has a tone assigned to it. For tone information, see the "Tone List" (page EN-76).

### 2. Release **TONE VARIATION** to complete the setting operation.

#### ■ Advanced Tones

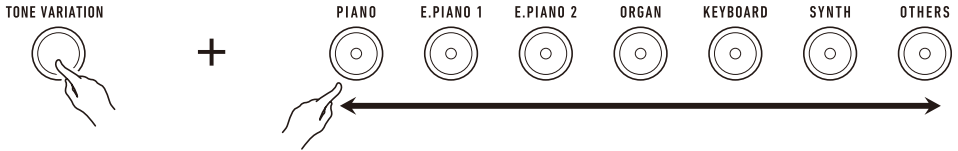
The **ADVANCED** TONE VARIATION LED lights when an advanced tone is selected. Advanced tones provide enhanced sound source control, and enable advanced expressive techniques, tone expression, and more.



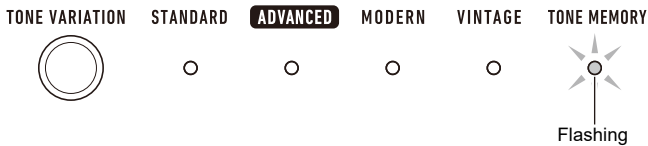
## Registering a Tone to a Main Tone Button (Tone Memory)

You can use tone memory to register tone and layer settings, octave shift settings, and other settings to main tone buttons. You will then be able to recall the registered settings when you need them to perform a particular song, etc.

1. While holding down **TONE VARIATION**, press the main button to which you want to register the tone settings.



This will sound a notification tone and cause the **TONE MEMORY** TONE VARIATION LED to flash momentarily, and register your tone settings.



- The **TONE MEMORY** TONE VARIATION LED and the main tone button where the setting was stored will light to indicate that the tone is selected.
- You can register up to seven setups, one to each of the main tone buttons.

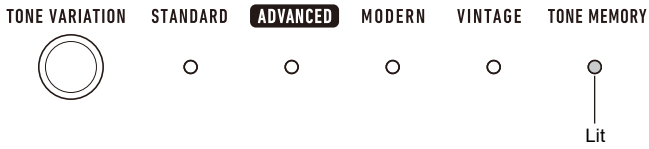
### Registered Settings

- Sustain
- Tone (main, layer)
- Layered
- Part octave shift (main, layer)
- Sustain time (main part, layer part)
- Part volume (main, layer)
- Pedal effect part (main, layer)
- Reverb type



**■ To recall a registered tone**

**1.** Check to make sure that the **TONE MEMORY TONE VARIATION LED** is lit.



- If it isn't, press **TONE VARIATION** as many times as necessary until the **TONE MEMORY TONE VARIATION LED** is lit.

**2.** Press the main tone button where the tone settings are registered.

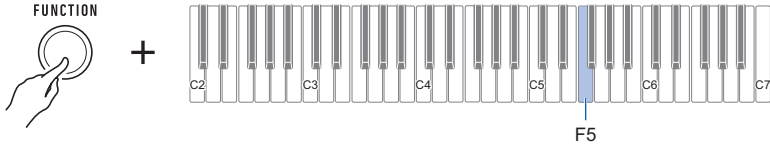
This will switch to the tone settings registered to the button.

## Playing with Touch Response

Touch Response alters tone volume in accordance with keyboard pressure (press velocity). This provides you some of the same expression capabilities you get on an acoustic piano.

### Changing Touch Response Sensitivity

1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **F5** keyboard key.



- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.

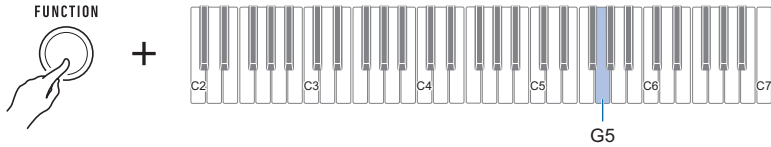
Notification tone	Setting type	Description
One low tone	Off	Keyboard pressure does not affect volume.
One high tone	Light	Easier to produce a louder sound than the Normal setting, for a lighter feel.
Two high tones	Normal	Normal Touch Response.
Three high tones	Heavy	More difficult to produce a louder sound, for a heavier feel.

2. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

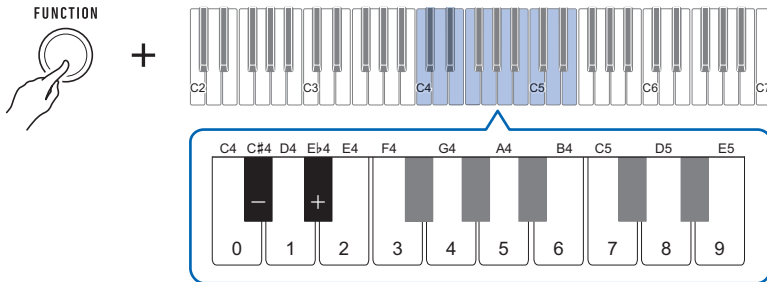
## ■ To adjust the volume when Touch Response is disabled (Touch off Velocity)

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **G5** keyboard key.

- Do not release **FUNCTION** until step 2, below.



### 2. Use keyboard keys **C4** through **E5** to set the volume level.



- You can specify a volume value from 1 to 127.
- Each press of the – or + keyboard key changes the volume value by 1. Long-pressing either of these keyboard keys scrolls the setting value.
- You can use keyboard keys 0 to 9 to enter a specific volume value.

Examples:

- To set a volume of 20, press 2, then 0. The volume setting will not change until you release **FUNCTION** in step 3, below.
- To set a volume of 120, press 1, then 2, then 0. In this case, the volume value will change as soon as you input the third digit.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the – and + keyboard keys at the same time.

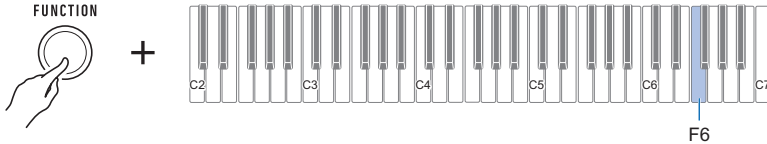
### 3. Release **FUNCTION**.

## Using a Pedal

A pedal (optional SP-3 or SP-20) can be used to apply various changes to your sound while playing. Under initial default settings, sustain is assigned to the pedal, so it can be used as a damper pedal.

### Changing Pedal Functions

#### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **F6** keyboard key.



- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.

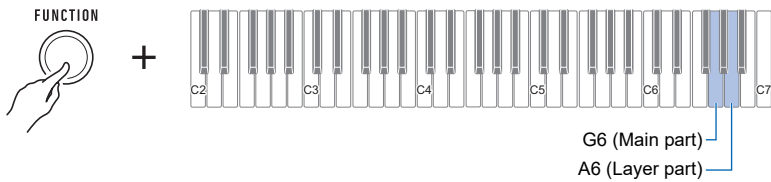
Notification Tone	Setting Type	Description
One tone	Pedal sustain	Playing notes while the pedal is depressed causes the notes to be sustained, even if the keyboard keys are released.
Two tones	Sostenuto	Playing notes and then pressing the pedal before the keyboard keys are released causes the notes to be sustained.
Three tones	Soft	Pressing the pedal and playing notes causes the notes to be slightly softened.
Four tones	Metronome	Starts and stops the metronome.

#### 2. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## ■ Disabling the Pedal Function Effect of Each Part

You can use the procedure below to disable the pedal function effect of the main part and layer part.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **G6** or **A6** keyboard key.



This disables the pedal function effect.

- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.

High tone: On

Low tone: Off

The pedal function effect is applied to parts that are turned on, and not applied to parts that are turned off.

### 2. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

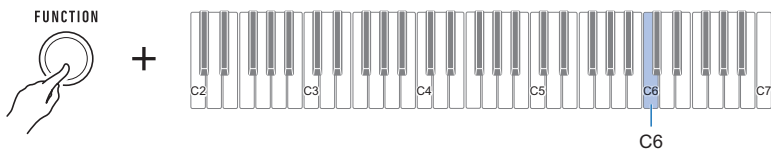
#### **NOTE**

- For details about parts, see “[Layering Two Tones](#)” (page [EN-32](#)).

## Sustaining Notes After Keyboard Keys Are Released

While sustain is enabled, notes are sustained longer when keyboard keys are released.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **C6** keyboard key.



This enables sustain.

- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.

High tone: On

Low tone: Off

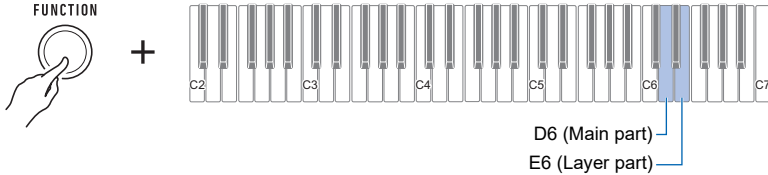
### 2. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## Adjusting the Sustain Time of the Parts

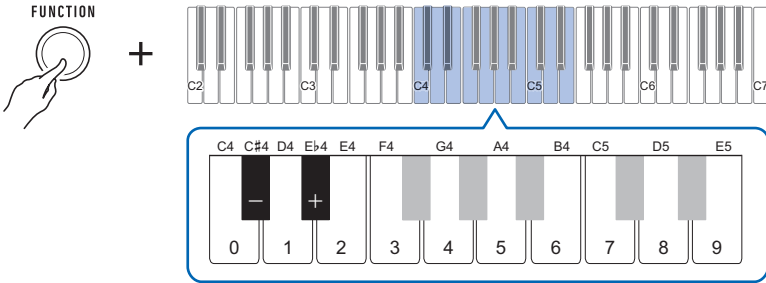
When sustain is enabled, you can use the procedure below to make the sustain times of the main part and layered part longer or shorter.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **D6** or **E6** keyboard key.

- Do not release **FUNCTION** until step 2, below.



### 2. Use keyboard keys **C4** through **E5** to set the sustain time.



- You can set a sustain time within the range of 0 to 9.
- Each press of the – or + keyboard key raises or lowers the sustain time setting by 1. Long-pressing either of these keyboard keys changes the setting at high speed.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the – and + keyboard keys at the same time.

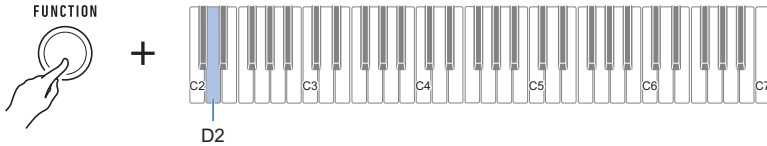
### 3. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## Playing with Reverb

You can use the procedure below to add reverb to the notes you play.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **D2** keyboard key.

- Do not release **FUNCTION** until step 2, below.



A notification tone will sound to indicate the reverb type selection mode.

### 2. Use keyboard keys **C2** through **C4** to select a reverb type.

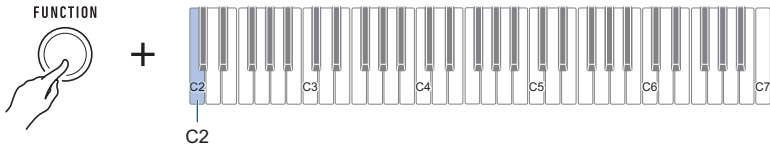
Keyboard Note Name	Reverb Type
C2	Depends on the tone.
C#2 to F2	Room 1 to 5
F#2 to G2	Large Room 1 or 2
A $\flat$ 2 to C#3	Hall 1 to 6
D3 to E3	Stadium 1 to 3
F3 to F#3	Plate 1 or 2
G3	Delay
A $\flat$ 3	Pan delay
A3 to B $\flat$ 3	Long delay 1 or 2
B3	Church
C4	Cathedral

This sounds a notification tone and sets the selected reverb type.

### 3. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## Turning off Reverb

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **C2** keyboard key.



This turns off reverb.

- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.  
High tone: On  
Low tone: Off

### 2. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## Playing with a Multi-dimensional Expanded Sound (Surround)

Enabling surround causes sound to expand multi-dimensionally, front, back, left, and right.

### 1. Press **SURROUND**.

This enables surround.

- The **SURROUND** button will be lit while the surround effect is enabled.

**SURROUND**



### 2. To disable surround, press **SURROUND** again.

- This causes the **SURROUND** button light to go out.

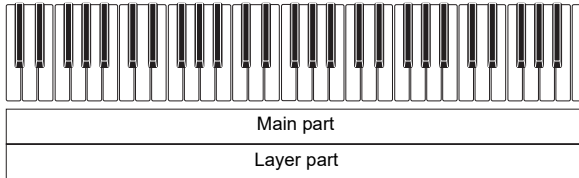
#### **NOTE**

- The surround effect is not applied while you are listening over headphones.
- Connecting headphones disables the surround effect.

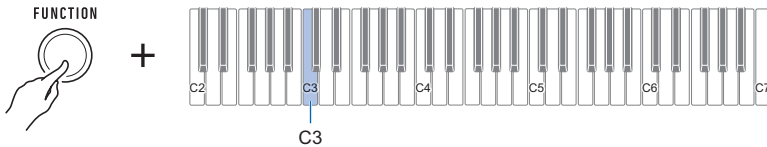


## Layering Two Tones

You can use the procedure below to layer two tones and output the resulting sound. The part that is played using a single tone is the main part, while the second part that is layered over the main part is the layer part.



### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **C3** keyboard key.

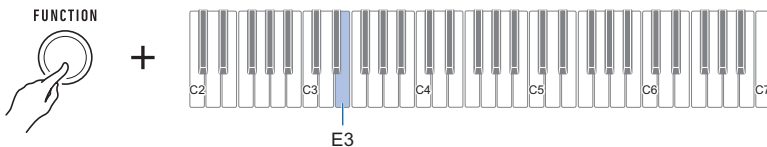


This enables layering.

- Each press of the keyboard key sounds a tone that lets you know what setting was selected.  
High tone: On  
Low tone: Off

### 2. To select the layer part, hold down **FUNCTION** as you press the **E3** keyboard key.

- Do not release **FUNCTION** until step 3, below.



### 3. Press a keyboard key within the range of **C2** through **C7** to select a tone.

This layers the tone you selected.

- Each of the keyboard keys has a tone assigned to it. For tone information, see the “[Tone List](#)” (page [EN-76](#)).

### 4. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

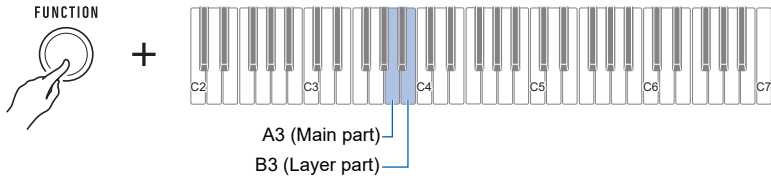
### 5. To cancel layering, hold down **FUNCTION** as you press the **C3** keyboard key.

## Adjusting the Volume Level of Each Part

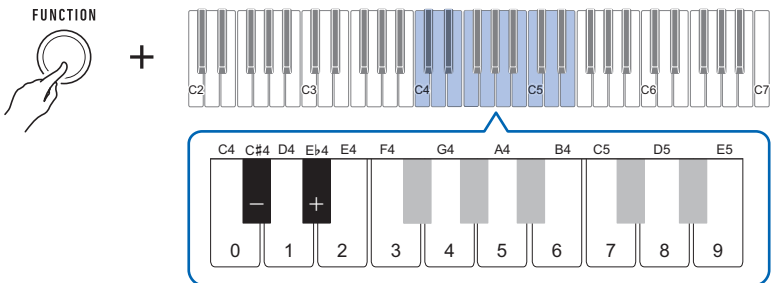
You can use the procedure below to adjust the volume level of the main tone and layer tone.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **A3** or **B3** keyboard key.

- Do not release **FUNCTION** until step 2, below.



### 2. Use keyboard keys **C4** through **E5** to set the volume level.



- You can specify a volume value from 0 to 127.
- Each press of the + or – keyboard key changes the volume value by 1. Long-pressing either of these keyboard keys scrolls the setting value.
- You can use keyboard keys 0 to 9 to enter a specific volume value.

Examples:

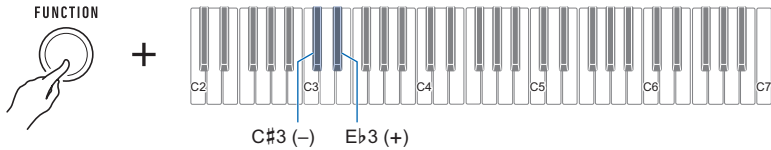
- To set a volume of 20, press 2, then 0. The volume setting will not change until you release **FUNCTION** in step 3, below.
- To set a volume of 120, press 1, then 2, then 0. In this case, the volume value will change as soon as you input the third digit.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the – and + keyboard keys at the same time.

### 3. Release **FUNCTION**.

## Changing the Pitch in Octave Units (Octave Shift)

You can use the procedure below to raise or lower pitch in octave units.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **C#3** or **E♭3** keyboard key.



Keyboard Note Name	Description
C#3	Lowers the pitch one octave.
E♭3	Raises the pitch one octave.

- You can specify a value in the range of -3 to +3 octaves.
- A reference tone sounds whenever the setting values becomes 0.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the - and + keyboard keys at the same time.

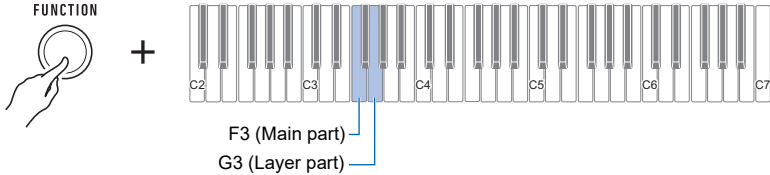
### 2. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## Changing the Pitch of Parts in Octave Units (Part Octave Shift)

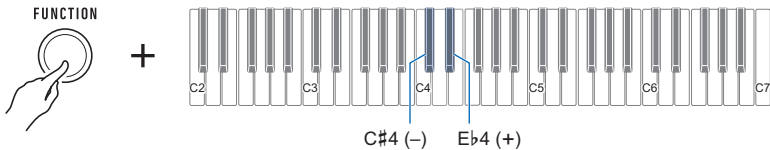
You can use the procedure below to raise or lower the pitches of the main part and layer part in octave units.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **F3** or **G3** keyboard key.

- Do not release **FUNCTION** until step 2, below.



### 2. Press the **C#4** or **E♭4** keyboard key.



Keyboard Note Name	Description
C#4	Lowers the pitch one octave.
E♭4	Raises the pitch one octave.

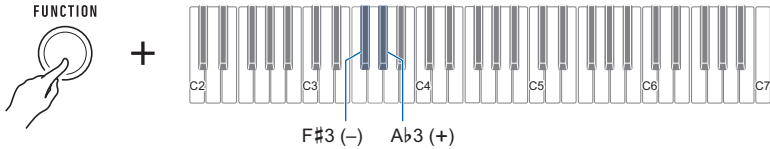
- You can specify a value in the range of -3 to +3 octaves.
- A reference tone sounds whenever the setting values becomes 0.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the - and + keyboard keys at the same time.
- If you changed a part tone, the part octave shift value is the recommended value of the newly selected part. For information about tone recommended values, see the “[Tone List](#)” (page [EN-76](#)).

### 3. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

## Changing the Pitch in Semitone Units (Transpose)

You can use the procedure below to raise the overall pitch in semitone steps. You can use this feature to raise or lower the key of the keyboard to make it easier to play a piece written in a difficult key, or to adjust to a key that better matches a vocalist, or another musical instrument.

### 1. While holding down **FUNCTION**, press the **F#3** or **A $\flat$ 3** keyboard key.



Keyboard Note Name	Description
F#3	Lowers the pitch one semitone.
A $\flat$ 3	Raises the pitch one semitone.

- The setting range is one octave up (+12 semitones) and down (-12 semitones).
- A reference tone sounds whenever the setting values becomes 0.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the - and + keyboard keys at the same time.

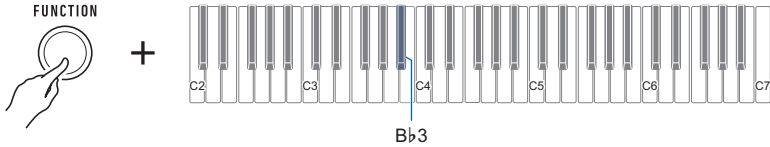

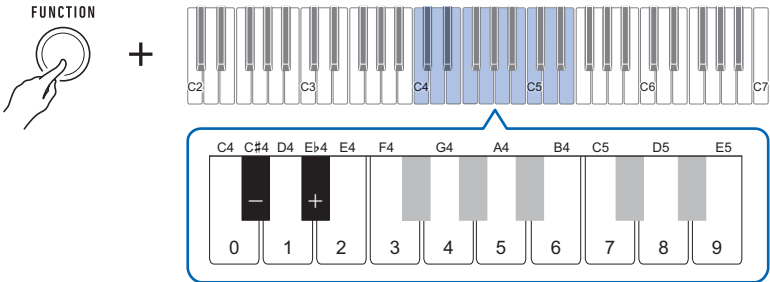

- A reference tone sounds whenever the setting values becomes an integer (whole number), such as 440, 441, etc.
- You can use keyboard keys 0 through 9 to input a three-digit integer value and then press **FUNCTION**. In this case, the digit to the right of the decimal point will automatically become 0.
- To return the setting to its initial default, press the – and + keyboard keys at the same time.

### 3. Release **FUNCTION** to complete the setting operation.

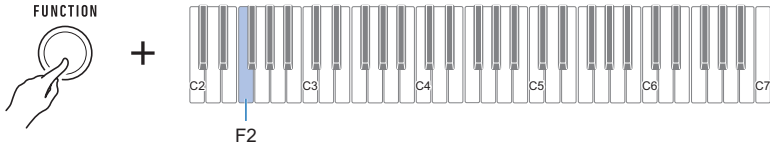
## Changing the Keyboard Scale Tuning

You can change the scale tuning of the keyboard from the standard equal temperament to another tuning that is more suitable for playing Indian music, Arabic music, classical music, etc. You can select from among 17 preset scale tunings.

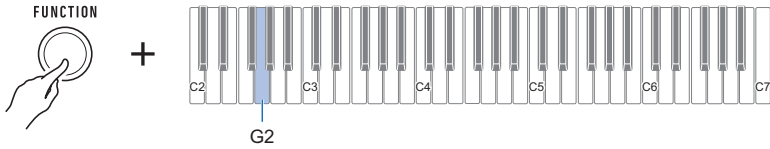

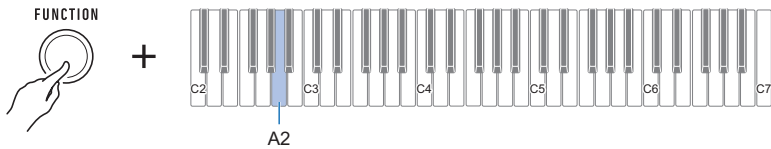

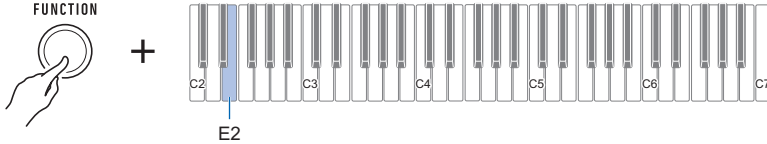

## Recording and Playing Back Keyboard Play

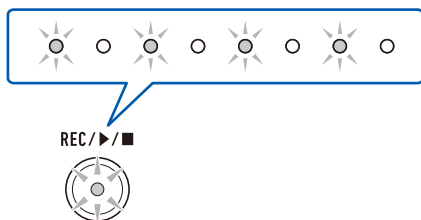
Use the procedure below to record what you play on the keyboard.

**1. Select a tone and configure the other settings you want to use for recording.**

**2. Press **REC/▶/■**.**



This causes the **REC/▶/■** button light to flash and enters record standby.



**3. Play what you want to record.**

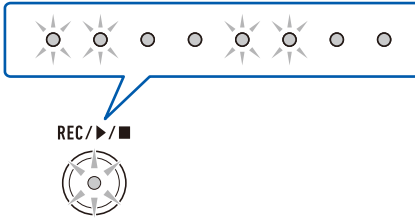
When you start to play, the **REC/▶/■** button light will stop flashing and recording will start.

### **NOTE**

- Up to approximately 40,000 notes can be recorded for a single song. When the number of remaining recordable notes is 100 or fewer, the **REC/▶/■** button light will flash. When the number of remaining recordable notes reaches zero, the **REC/▶/■** button light will go out and recording will stop automatically.
- Up to approximately 999 measures can be recorded for a single song. When the number of remaining recordable measures is 32 or fewer, the **REC/▶/■** button light will flash. When the number of remaining recordable measures reaches zero, the **REC/▶/■** button light will go out and recording will stop automatically.
- You can record while the metronome is sounding. See “Using the Metronome” (page EN-15).

#### 4. To stop recording, press **REC/▶/■**.

This causes the **REC/▶/■** button light to flash and enters playback standby. After a pre-count sounds, playback of what you recorded will start.



#### 5. To stop playback, press **REC/▶/■**.

This causes the **REC/▶/■** button light to go out and stops playback.

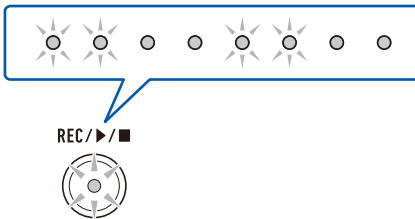
### ! IMPORTANT!

- Turning off the Digital Keyboard while recording is in progress will cause the recording to be deleted.
- A new recording replaces (deletes) previously recorded contents.
- Depending on the tone you are using and the reverb setting, the sound produced during playback may be different from the sound that you heard when you recorded.

#### ■ To play back a recorded performance later

#### 1. Press **REC/▶/■** as many times as necessary to start playback of the song you recorded.

- This starts playback of the performance you recorded.

## ⚠ IMPORTANT!

- Do not perform any Digital Keyboard operation while it is in the process of connecting with the smart device app.
- With a Bluetooth connection, your communication environment or the capabilities of your smart device can cause noticeable communication delay or sound distortion when using the app’s lesson function. If this happens, try the countermeasures below.
  - Refer to the app’s user documentation and review how to use the lesson function and the information about MIDI playback quality.
  - Use a cable connection instead of Bluetooth.
- If you are connecting with Bluetooth, do not use the **USB TO HOST** port if you plan to use a CASIO smart device app.

## Connecting to a Computer and Using MIDI

You can connect the Digital Keyboard to a computer and exchange MIDI data between them. You can record your performance using computer music software, and use the Digital Keyboard to play data sent from a computer.

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- Incorrect connections can make data exchange impossible. Be sure to follow the steps of the procedure below.

1. Turn off the Digital Keyboard and then start up your computer.
  - Do not start up the music software on your computer yet!
2. Use a commercially available USB cable to connect your computer to the Digital Keyboard's **USB TO HOST** port.
  - Use a USB 2.0 or 1.1 A-micro-B connector type USB cable that supports data communication.
3. Turn on the Digital Keyboard.
  - If this is the first time you are connecting, the driver required to transfer data will automatically be installed on your computer.
4. Start up commercially available music software on your computer.
5. Use the settings of your computer's commercially available music software to select "CASIO USB- MIDI" as the MIDI device.
  - For information about how to select the MIDI device, refer to the user documentation that comes with the music software you are using.

### IMPORTANT!

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- Be sure to turn on the Digital Keyboard before starting up your computer's music software.

## Using a Cable to Connect with an Audio Device

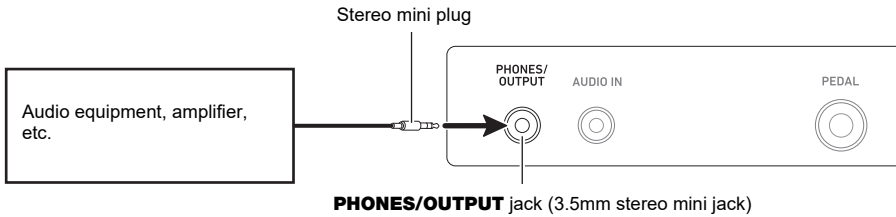
### ■ Sounding Output from the Digital Keyboard on an External Device

Connection requires commercially available connecting cords, supplied by you.

Use a connecting cord that has a stereo mini plug on one end for connection to this Digital Keyboard, and a plug that matches the configuration of the input jack of external device on the other end.

### ! IMPORTANT!

- Turn off the external device and the Digital Keyboard before connecting them. Before turning power on or off, turn down the volume level of this Digital Keyboard and external devices.
- After connecting, turn on this Digital Keyboard first and then the external device.
- If this Digital Keyboard's notes are distorted when they are sounded on an external audio device, lower the Digital Keyboard's volume level.
- The headphones you use must have a 3.5mm 3-pole stereo mini plug. Use of other types of plugs is not supported.



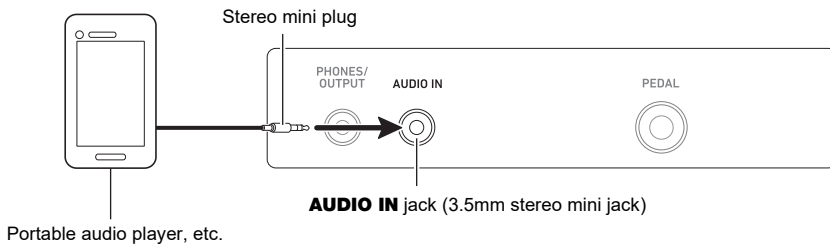
## ■ Sounding Input From an External Device on This Digital Keyboard

Connection requires commercially available connecting cords, supplied by you.

The connecting cord should have a stereo mini plug on one end for connection to this Digital Keyboard and a plug that matches the configuration of the output jack of external device on the other end. When sounding input from an external device with this Digital Keyboard, use the external device controls to adjust the volume level. In this case, you cannot adjust the volume level on this Digital Keyboard.

### ! IMPORTANT!

- Turn off this Digital Keyboard before connecting. Before turning power on or off, turn down the volume level of the Digital Keyboard and external devices.
- After connecting, turn on the external device and then this Digital Keyboard.
- If external device notes sounded by this Digital Keyboard are distorted, lower the external device's volume level.

- The end of the connecting cord you connect to the Digital Keyboard must have a 3.5mm 3-pole stereo mini plug. Use of other types of plugs is not supported.



## ■ AUDIO IN center cancel (Vocal Cut)

Enabling Vocal Cut cuts (mutes or minimizes) the vocal part in the sound being input with the **AUDIO IN** jack or Bluetooth audio. Note that this function cancels the sound in the center position of the audio, which may (depending on how the original audio was mixed) end up canceling something else other than the vocal part. How vocal cut is performed depends on the sound being input. For information about how to configure settings, see the "[Keyboard Keys Used for Configuring Settings](#)" (pages EN-49 through 58).

- Built-in effects (reverb) of the Digital Keyboard are not applied to **AUDIO IN** jack input.

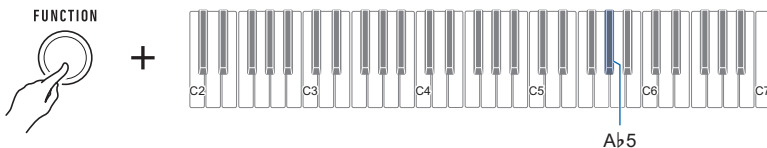
## Sounding a Bluetooth Audio Capable Device (Bluetooth Audio Pairing)

You can use a Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor (optional WU-BT10) to pair this Digital Keyboard with an external Bluetooth audio capable audio device and then playback from the external device through this Digital Keyboard's speakers.

### IMPORTANT!

- Before performing the pairing operation, turn down the volume levels of this Digital Keyboard and the external device.
- If external device notes sounded by this Digital Keyboard are distorted, lower the external device's volume level.
- If the volume level of the external device notes sounds by this Digital Keyboard lower than the volume level of the notes you are playing on the keyboard, adjust the volume level of each Digital Keyboard part to balance them. See “[Adjusting the Volume Level of Each Part](#)” on page [EN-33](#).
- Setting the volume level of the external device too high can cause Digital Keyboard power to turn off in order to protect it against damage. If this happens, lower the volume level of the external device.
- Due to Bluetooth characteristics, you may notice some lag in notes. If that happens, connect using a USB cable.

1. Long-press the  (Power) button to turn off the Digital Keyboard.
2. Plug the Wireless MIDI & audio adaptor into the **USB TO DEVICE** port (page [EN-11](#)).
3. Press the  (Power) button to turn on the Digital Keyboard.
4. While holding down **FUNCTION**, long press the **A $\flat$ 5** keyboard key.



This causes a tone to sound every few seconds, indicating the Bluetooth audio pairing mode.

- To exit the Bluetooth audio pairing mode, press the A $\flat$ 5 keyboard key again.

This will stop the tone and exit the Bluetooth audio pairing mode.

5. Release **FUNCTION**.
6. Use the setting screen of the Bluetooth capable audio device to select “**WU-BT10 AUDIO**” to pair with this Digital Keyboard.

This causes a tone to sound and connects with the Bluetooth audio capable device.

## 7. Produce sound on the Bluetooth audio capable device.

Output from the audio Bluetooth capable device will sound from the Digital Keyboard's speakers.

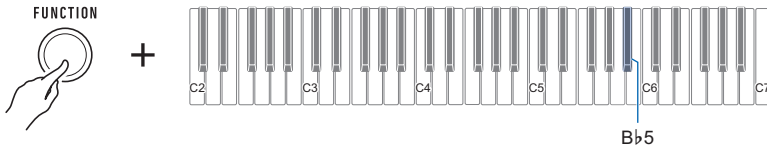

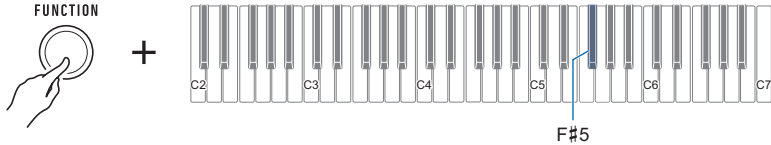
